




Orange, the idol of the infield, was one of the best defense players known in collegiate baseball. He was a daring menace to any opposing team. He set a standard in the position of shortstop scarcely to be equaled. We remember him for his courage and pugnacity. He left with us a batting average of .232 and a fielding average of .871.

"Spider" Ware, protected the initial sack with a degree of perfection not to be paralleled. He is now conspicuous by his absence. "Spider" was held in high esteem by all baseball fans. We remember him for his fidelity and effective service, and have recorded his batting average of .379 and fielding average of .984.

Shackelford, better known as "Gabel," is always an asset to the team with which he is associated. His fame became National after his second year's service with a National league team. His latest affiliation was with the Harrisburg team of Harrisburg, Pa. He is steady, persistent, and belligerent. His batting and fielding averages were .289 and .870, respectively.

John Kelly Wright, the light "Bambino" of Milford, Texas, demanded respect by his use of the "stick." He was a good hitter without a doubt. That was the distinct feature for which he won the high esteem of Coach Long. He maintained a batting average of .453, which was spectacular, indeed. His fielding average was .861.

No member of the team showed more effective enthusiasm than Pardee, the celebrated veteran of Corsicana, Texas. He was always loyal and performed behind the bat with unusual ability. "Jack House" was truly a menace to base runners. He was reliable as a batter. His batting average was .290; and his fielding average was .965.

Lorden, the pugnacious outfield veteran of several seasons, proved his worth by his consistent fielding and batting. He was always dangerous to the opponents on account of his fearless activity in the outfield. In all games "Tank" was courageous and faithful. His batting average was .329; his fielding average was .857.

Murry defended second base during the past season in a very creditable manner. Coach Long recognized in him a valuable contribution to the team. He plays with great courage and slugs with a vengeance. This season finds him at the "hot corner."

Ingram, the well known veteran of the garden, is known for his great defense of left field. "Johnnie Tobin" will linger in the memory of the Wileyites for many seasons. Hit batting and fielding averages, respectively, are .315 and .786.

Lucas, the "ace," known to baseball circles as "Iron Man Luke," was a mainstay on the varsity nine. He developed quite a prestige by winning the six games in which he played. "Bill" was a real star and was best when the game
